

Head's letter



It has been a remarkable year, as will be obvious from the pages of this newsletter. Without doubt, the most significant event was the Royal Visit on 24 July, when HM the Queen and HRH the Duke of Edinburgh came to King's.

The weather was kind to us in that it did not rain but the day was dull and overcast and not to the Duke's liking. He was heard to ask what it would be like in winter if it were so cold in the summer. On the other hand, the event **was** to everyone's liking and it was a great day for the school and the community who joined us on the main field during and after the visit.

Once again, our academic performance has been outstanding and details can be found in the main article on this page as well as elsewhere in the newsletter. The results certainly made it a summer to celebrate but, unusually, I have a third special event to outline. Macclesfield has marked the Quincentenary of the school by awarding King's the Freedom of the Borough. Any of you who see me with my flock of sheep grazing outside St Michael's will know that I am exercising my rights on the school's behalf. Seriously, this is a very prestigious honour and I will be attending a ceremony to mark the event in October. The last institution to be so honoured was the Cheshire Regiment in 1949, so King's can be assured that it is in extremely elevated company.

BREAKING THE RECORDS

Congratulations to King's pupils who have produced very good A level results this year, with 81.7% at grades A–C. The pass rate was a very pleasing 99.8%, with 32.6% at A grade.

The overall picture was:

- 28 pupils with 3 A grades or better.
- 9 pupils with 3 A grades and 2 A grades at AS.
- 8 pupils obtained 4 A grades.
- 425 out of 426 entries were passes.
- 5 out of 6 passes were grades A–C
- 1 in 3 entries was passed at grade A.

Richard Cartmel secured one of the top five marks in the country in both his Chemistry and Computing papers (see page 2).

At GCSE the pupils excelled with 56.3% of the grades at A/A*, a school record. The A*–C pass rate was 97%, with boys and girls demonstrating almost identical figures.



Biathlon man



King's sixth former, Stephen Campbell, came second in the 17/18 age range, making him the second best at his sport in the world for his age group. The Queen at King's

The royal seal of approval was set on King's Quincentennial celebrations when Her Majesty the Queen, accompanied by His Royal Highness, the Duke of Edinburgh, visited the school in July. As part of her tour, the Queen was shown three different classrooms representing three different times in history.

The first room featured a dramatic reenactment of a schoolroom in 1502, with a lesson in Latin and an introduction from Sir John Percyvale, King's founding father.

The 1952 classroom was recreated in collaboration with the Silk Heritage Centre in Macclesfield. This time, the lesson was Art, focusing on the work of Charles Tunnicliffe, who was born on a farm locally and became famous for his bird paintings.



The Queen met several pupils before a recital from the King's Foundation Choirfeaturing the first movement of John Rutter's *Gloria*. Her Majesty then unveiled a commemorative stone that now stands next to the flagpole on the Cumberland Street site.

His Royal Highness also met several pupils, including a large selection of Duke of Edinburgh Award winners and the sailing club. He showed a particular interest in the World War I Battlefields group exhibition and the group that helps disabled swimmers, the Macclesfield Seals.
