## Debating team battle to reach **Oxford Union**



King's debating team has reached the regional finals of the English Speaking Union's Mace Debating competition, the oldest debating competition in the country.

The team sailed through two local qualifiers to gain a place at the regional finals. Ben O'Donnell, Sofia

Ghorbanian and Nicholas Reynolds successfully opposed the motion that "This House believes MPs should be barred from holding second jobs."

Head of English, Mr Kellett, said: "It's a massive achievement to reach the regional finals and just six schools will go on to the finals in the Oxford University Union. The process requires intelligent planning and research as well as quick, on-the-spot thinking."

# Physics Olympiad Ollie wins Gold!

A Level student Ollie Hall has won a Gold Medal in the National Physics Olympiad. From an elite entry of the nation's top young physicists, he came in the top 12 per cent, to earn the hugely prestigious Olympic Gold.

Sitting a demanding two-hour paper, higher than A Level standard, Ollie said: "Physics is an incredible subject and



Physics specialists are in high demand, not just because of the specific training it offers, but because all the other sciences are derived from Physics."

Ollie, who is also a keen tennis player, is reading Physics, Maths, Further Maths and Chemistry at A Level and is hoping to go join either Durham or Manchester University.

King's Head of Physics, Dr Hartnett, said: "Ollie is an outstanding student who always shows such enthusiasm for the subject and asks interesting, challenging questions. He has a real talent and richly deserves this huge honour."



## Team GB call-up for Emma

Sixth Form student and sport climber Emma Edwards has earned selection for the Great Britain Youth Climbing team. The super fit endurance athlete ultimately has Olympic ambitions, but first wants to establish her credentials on the national and international stage.

Competitive sport climbing has three categories: Boulder, Lead and Speed, and Emma is training for both Boulder and Lead which involve mastering different and increasingly difficult holds and routes to the top of the wall. Emma trains for around 16 hours each week and recently came fourth in a national event in Norwich.

"Our MP did an outstanding job of helping our students to understand the political process so they can access it both for their studies and also their appreciation of the wider world."




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**Pupil Voice** is part of what helps to make King's the school that it is - there are many different groups throughout the school which are designed to promote pupil opinion and dialogue, as well as create opportunities for them to positively impact on their own school lives. Here, pupils **ALEX McCALL** and **EMMA GRAHAM** explain how pupil voice is heard:





#### **School Council**

The School Council is the peak of the student voice in the School and all meetings are student-led. The Juniors, Seniors and Sixth Form each have individual councils. The heads of these councils, the Core Council, meet termly in a whole school meeting to further discuss issues from across the School. At Divisional Council Meetings, form representatives discuss topics that have been set out in advance, such as

environmental friendliness of school, diversity, inclusion and food options, to name just a few; any other business allows additional items to be raised.

In the Sixth Form, Chairs of the Sixth Form Council meet with the Principal, Mr Davies, after each of our meetings with Prefects and Form Representatives to discuss the issues raised, and work to find solutions – taking comments, suggestions, or conclusions back to the Council for further debate

The Council Heads then work to implement any ideas which have a great deal of support – such as Sixth Form students being allowed to have driving lessons in their free periods. In the Infant & Junior Division and the Senior Division, a member of staff supports the meetings to offer immediate feedback or gather ideas to take away for further discussion. Overall, the Councils are a fundamental structure that contribute to the student voice being considered at every level.

#### Pupil Leadership Group (left)

Once at term, our Foundation School Captains come together to share experiences and developments within their own Divisions. Our Junior Head Boy and Girl, our Senior Division Head Boy and Girl and our two Sixth Form School Captains meet formally and feedback their observations and ideas to their Principals. It is always a wonderful opportunity to get pupils from across all three Divisions together.

#### **Catering Committee (right)**

In both the Senior Division and Infant & Junior Division, Catering Committee Meetings are held: food is very important at King's! Each form appoints a Catering Committee Representative at the beginning of the year and they represent their form at our half termly meetings with our Catering Team managers, Jamie and Diego.

This meeting offers the students an opportunity to share favourite dishes and discuss any less popular ones! The Catering Committee discuss break time and lunch provision, endeavouring to ensure our catering provision is the best it can be, with a balance of dishes that are healthy and nutritious alongside a few that are naughty, but so nice! The Catering Committee Team also make suggestions regarding Theme Days and Gala Lunches which we enjoy on a regular basis as a special treat.

#### **The Feminist Society**

One of the newest additions to the pupil voice scheme is the Feminist Society – this group was established by Politics teacher, Ms Berzins, partly as a response to the murder of Sarah Everard. The group meets weekly to discuss feminism, both in the school community and the world as a whole. It is open to all and aims to improve the universal understanding of what exactly the female experience is, hoping to eradicate microaggressions and misogyny, alongside providing a space for people to discuss their own feelings and encounters with misogynistic behaviour.

#### **Politics Pressure Groups**

In the Autumn Term, Government and Politics students from the Sixth Form participated in a Pressure Group Challenge – based on the democratic principle that people should be able to join groups that can confront the Government on issues that they care strongly about.

The challenge saw pupils from Year 12 and 13 producing ideas for things that they would like to see changed around school or in the local community, creating a campaign to go alongside it and, finally, presenting their work to the Senior Management Team and facing



rigorous questioning! Topics chosen included; introducing Politics as a subject to the younger years, improving education on menstruation at every age group and even making homework optional. This week-long event allowed students to raise issues that they felt passionately about, as well as helping them to articulate their opinions and ideas effectively.

#### **Student Surveys**

Student surveys are, by far, the most wide-reaching aspect of the student voice. Surveys are sent out to the entire school and the results used to make relevant decisions - such as whether students would wish to donate an extra £1 for their Christmas lunch to support the homeless community, Sixth Form students' experiences of discrimination based on gender and whole school vaccination surveys. These surveys help give students direct input into the School and are a useful way of empowering their voices. Surveys are also used to alean information regarding pupil attitudes and experiences. As always, the pupil voices are heard as we strive to make King's the best we can.

#### **Equality and Diversity Council**

The Equality and Diversity Council has been steadily growing over a few years, now having many members from across year groups. The Council seeks to both provide a safe space where students can be open about their experiences and feelings – as well as coming up with ideas for how equality could be improved across the School as a whole. Past initiatives include: altering the uniform regulations to be gender-neutral, changing the rules surrounding Black hairstyles in school and running schemes to provide a greater understanding and acceptance of the LGBTQ+ community.

#### **Merit First**

Merit First is a programme for secondary schools and youth groups across the world to join a community of students to do good and support the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Our Merit First Council is entirely pupil-led and their achievements to date are aplenty, both in school and in our wider Macclesfield community.



Overall, students have countless opportunities to be involved in the School, and the pupil voice is considered an important factor in all of this.
