Emily Middleton, King's school captain, has won the £3,000 first prize in a top poetry competition. The Christopher Tower Poetry Prize, funded by a bequest to Christ Church, Oxford, is the UK's most highly regarded poetry award for 16 to 18 year-olds.

Emily is pictured being congratulated by the Dean of Christ Church at a reception at the college. Her poem 'The Five Stages', written in response to the competition's theme of 'Change' and one of 600 entries, impressed the judges with its astonishing verbal flair and technical accomplishment.

Not content to excel in this area alone, Emily also entered the Institute of Economic Affairs Student Essay Competition where she was joint runner-up with an incisive essay entitled 'Climate Change and Market Failure'.





Taking action

Two Girls' Division students were so appalled by the situation in Darfur that they invited representatives from the AEGIS Trust to give a talk at the school. The Trust campaigns to prevent genocide worldwide and also leads political lobbying to stop ethnic cleansing in Sudan. The girls, Katie Reid and Isabel Wilkinson, have now set up the school's own AEGIS action group and organised a school petition and fundraising effort. Though they know they can have little effect on the Sudanese forces, they are determined to spread awareness locally of the plight of hundreds of frightened Darfurian refugees in this country.




Challenging maths

Laura Embrey and Dmitri Whitmore have achieved outstanding success in the Junior Mathematics Challenge, organised by the Mathematical Association. Out of 108,000 entrants from 2,880 schools, they both reached the final, alongside 750 other children. Dmitri, whilst still only in Year 5, was placed among the top 100 competitors and won a Silver Award, and Year 6 pupil Laura's mark put her in the top 50, for which she was awarded a Gold.

Founders' Day

This year's Founders' Day speaker was former pupil Duncan Robinson, Master of Magdalene College, Cambridge, and internationally distinguished art historian and author. Duncan lived in Kidsgrove as a boy, travelling to school on the train every day, before going to Clare College, Cambridge. His impressive academic career includes master's degrees from Clare and Yale. In a fascinating address, he encouraged the pupils to value their inheritance as members of a school with a fine tradition, and to continue that spirit of excellence with their own achievements.



Just magic

Year 10 pupil Douglas Tilston finished second in the World Junior Magician Championships in Blackpool. He often entertains boys at King's using close-up skills in magic, a highlight being when he produces a bottle of wine from nowhere.



A talent contest, also organised by boys in Year 10, was one of many activities held in aid of the Samaritans. Alex Frankell, accompanied on piano by Tom Baston, stole the show with a Keane number. Comedy routines, music solos and light-hearted world record attempts helped make it a memorable event.

Bookworms

Junior pupils enjoyed a book-themed week in March, with many activities and competitions, including decorating classroom doors as the front covers of books, a Big Read Challenge and a Book Character Dressing Up Day. Flat Stanley, Dennis the Menace, Cruella de Vil, Dracula and Frodo the Hobbit happily rubbed shoulders and it gave the children a chance to share their favourite characters.

A highlight was the three-day visit by the poet David Horner, who led a poetry workshop with each class. The children had the chance to read some of their poems during assemblies and also really enjoyed listening to his work. About fifty pupils chose to give up watching television and playing computer games during Book Week and opted to enjoy extra reading time instead.

Poetry masterclass

Poet Michael Symmons Roberts visited King's on World Book Day. In addition to several poetry collections, Michael's work includes opera libretti written in collaboration with composer James MacMillan and a long poem 'Last Words', performed by Sir Anthony Sher, which was commissioned by Radio 4 to mark the first anniversary of 9/11. Michael's collection, *Corpus* won the Whitbread Prize for Poetry in 2004.

Michael spent the day with Year 8 pupils on both sites. He read from his poetry, answered questions from his audience on his working practices and then helped selected pupils with their own poetry.



The Year of the Rat

A traditional Chinese show, complete with Dragon and Lion dance, was the infants' way of greeting the Year of the Rat. Eyes on England

Chris Connolly's great ambition is to open the bowling for England. He has been signed up by the Lancashire Academy, has already achieved a bowling speed of 82mph and has set his sights on 95mph. Similarly, Sam has become a potent force in the U15 A side, having not previously been a regular member.



Equine first

King's is the first school in Cheshire to set up its own Equestrian Society. The brainchild of two teachers with a passion for riding, Rachel Maddocks and Jenny Pinkham, the society has already attracted 24 riders. They meet each week at livery centres and stables across the county to develop dressage and show-jumping skills. Classes and competitions are being arranged against schools and clubs from the North and Midlands and, although most of the riders are from the Girls' Division, the society is also attracting a growing number of boys.

The play's the thing

There's always an undercurrent of excitement and anticipation when a major new drama production is brewing at King's – and the first night never disappoints. Over the years, the school has built up a remarkable reputation for the quality of its performances – and with good reason. The staff involved give and expect total commitment, and the students respond with an astonishing display of talent and professionalism. Audiences buy tickets, not out of a sense of duty but with the certainty of enjoying an unforgettable night out.

This year's productions alone give a taste of the scope and imagination characterising drama throughout the school. They range from David Farr's sparkling new adaptation of *Ramayana* and a thrilling staging of *Oliver!* at Cumberland Street, to Timberlake Wertenbaker's modern classic *The Ash Girl* and the enchanting musical *Antiphony* at Fence Avenue.

In Antiphony, a tale of insect rivalry and inspiration, Year 6 delighted audiences with superb choreography, singing and costumes. By contrast, *The Ash Girl* was a dark, moving retelling of the Cinderella fable, subtly translated into a profound story about depression and human fallibility.

Oliver's cast of over 50 from Years 7-12 bewitched with their youthful verve and sheer musical ability and there were many outstanding individual performances. The Dramatic Society, with a cast almost as large, rose magnificently to the challenge of the blank verse of *Ramayana*. Though very much a morality play, it has moments of great comedy and the actors brought the extraordinary characters and events to life with energy and passion.
